

External Complaint Workflow No Investigation Sub-Classification General Definitions

It is the policy of the Department to accept and investigate all complaints of misconduct or wrongdoing from any citizen as prescribed by state law and Department policy. Complaints are handled in accordance with Texas Government Code, Section 614.021-614.023, as interpreted by the City Attorney.

A No Investigation (NI) number is assigned to information received in the Internal Affairs Division that does not meet the guidelines of a complaint requiring a full investigation by the Department. The information is given a sub-classification for statistical tracking purposes. The current sub-classifications used are:

- Does not meet criteria- Complaints relative to differences of opinion between a citizen and the investigating officer regarding the contributing factors listed on an accident report will not be investigated. If a person calls or comes in but does not want to provide a written statement at that time, it will be entered. If they fail to follow up and provide a written complaint in any format, it may result in this sub-classification.
- Duplicate Complaint- Person is making a repeated allegation that has already been handled by the department.
- Fail to Articulate- Person may be complaining but does not make an allegation of misconduct.
- Guilt or Innocence-
 - Complaints relative to differences of opinion between a citizen and an arresting police officer regarding the guilt or innocence of that citizen will not be investigated but will be properly disposed of within the judicial system. If a citizen can furnish evidence that the arrest was malicious and/or illegal, the complaint may be investigated at the discretion of the Internal Affairs Division Commander.
 - Complaints relative to differences of opinion between a police officer and a citizen over the issuance of a traffic citation will not be investigated unless there is an allegation of a violation of law or departmental rules on the part of the officer.
- Information Only- A person may just be sending information or needing something from a member of the department. For instance, needing a detective to call them back about a case. A complaint about having to wait a long time for a police response to a 911 call may receive this sub-classification. Information is forwarded to division of responsibility.
- More Information- Person makes an allegation of misconduct, but the department needs more information to make determination on how to proceed.

- No Violation- Preliminary investigation is able to determine, based on evidence available, there is no violation of department procedures. Complaints involving a citizen's misunderstanding of departmental policy, which are resolved by a supervisor explaining the correct departmental policy and where the citizen is satisfied with the response, will not require investigation.
- **No Violation BWC-** Preliminary investigation is able to determine there is no violation due to review of officer's body worn camera.
- **Non-Employee** Person makes allegation into misconduct of person who is not an employee of the police department.
- **Sixty Day** Complaints are not typically accepted more than sixty days after the alleged incident, with the following exceptions:
 - When the complaint involves a criminal violation, the criminal statute of limitations will prevail.
 - When the complainant can show good cause for not making the complaint within the specified time limit.
- Third Party- Person complaining has no direct knowledge of incident. Often used when
 person sends an email or letter after seeing a negative news or social media story.

In all case, the citizen is sent a return letter to inform them that the information or complaint has been received and how it will be handled. If the department is not going to investigate, the reason is given with contact information on who they may call to discuss.



Office of Community Police Oversight Complaints Received

February 2020

Enclosed are the complaints received in the Office of Community Police Oversight for the weeks of January 31 to February 29, 2020.

Since the opening of the office there have been one hundred complaints received. There were thirty -two complaints received by the office in February of 2020. Below are summaries of those complaints. They are broken into two categories:

- Actual complaints against the Dallas Police Department
- Contacts from individuals received through the complaint system that are not actually complaints against the Dallas Police Department. In those cases, individuals were directed to the appropriate departments/agencies for services.

Complainant alleges harassment by Dallas SWAT officers. The
complainant stated he was pursued by SWAT TEAM officers in four
DPD squad cars and was in fear of his safety.
Complainant alleges that an officer falsified information on a traffic
citation for speeding. Individual stated the citation was for speeding in a
school zone that according to complainant did not exist.
Complainant alleges that two officers falsely arrested individual for DWI
and being in the street. Individual alleges that officers searched his vehicle
and did not read him his rights or what he was being charged with until
he was booked at the station.
Complainant alleges that officer at the McDonalds was being very rude
and rushing everyone who was ordering and eating at the restaurant.
Complainant alleges he was being discriminated against on the phone by
two dispatchers.
Complainant alleges officers made improper comments during
investigation interview with his mother.
Complainant alleges officers took improper actions during a fight and
arrest of his brother and father. Items were allegedly stolen during
booking and release.
Complainant was hit by a drunk driver. During the encounter he had
concerns about his interaction with the 911 dispatcher and the DPD
officer that wrote the report.
Complainant alleges untrue report by off duty DPD officer regarding a
car crash in which she states, the officer ran into her son's car.
Complainant alleges officers made racial comments instead of caring for
the citizens.
Complainant with a mental condition alleges officers mentally and
physically abused him during his arrest and treated him very poorly.
Complainant alleges her 911 dispatch call was erased.

Complaints



February 15,.2020	Complainant alleges she was threatened with citation for asking for officer's information. Officers yelled at her and handled the incident unprofessionally.
February 17, 2020	Complainant alleges improper actions and excessive forced was use by officers called to her residence. Complainant alleges officers tossed off their body worn cameras (BWC) then became physically aggressive towards her during the arrest.
February 18, 2020	Complainant was stopped by a bicycle patrol officer for allegedly crossing during red light. When compliant asked for the officer's supervisor's information, he was hand cuffed and had his wallet taken out of his back pocket to write a citation.
February 18, 2020	Complainant alleges that DPD officer did not get complete or accurate statements during a car accident.
February 19, 2020	Complainant alleges that DPD officer tried to instigate a false arrest of him in a Lowe's Department Store parking lot.
February 19, 2020	Complainant alleges political favor by DPD offices contrary to public safety regarding the traffic stop of the alleged son of a Dallas District Community Development Commissioner.
February 22, 2020	Complaint alleges that during her stay of three months, a well-known celebrity paid the Dallas Police force to humiliate her.
February 22, 2020	Complaint alleges police misconduct during the alleged hotel eviction of her and her 1-year old child by DPD officers.
February 24, 2020	Complaint alleges the narrative in police report involving car incident was incorrect and the service she received from the supervising officer during February visit to South West station was rude.
February 25, 2020	Complaint is a City of Dallas employee and alleges that a DPD motorcycle officer is targeting her. She bases this allegation on the fact that she was given a second citation for the same violation, under the same circumstances less than a year ago.
February 25, 2020	Complaint alleges lack of communication from the City of Dallas and DPD concerning an investigation involving the murder of her son's father by Dallas police.
February 29, 2020	Complaint alleges that she was on an emergency phone call with her daughter standing outside of a McDonalds, when an DPD officer came up to her and started harassing her and speaking to her very sarcastically.

SUBJECT Case Update: Diamond Ross

During the December 10, 2019 Community Police Oversight Board meeting, a motion was made and adopted to initiate an independent investigation concerning the Diamond Ross incident, pending the conclusion of all finding, recommendations, and related actions of the Internal Affairs division¹.

At the time of the motion, the Police Monitor had not been hired. The Community Police Oversight Board worked with the City of Dallas (specifically Assistant City Manager Jon Fortune) to hire an independent company to complete the review of the Police Department's Investigation.

After reviewing several proposals from various companies, the Community Police Oversight Board and the City of Dallas hired the Whitney Smith Company which is located in Fort Worth, Texas. Attached is the engagement letter outlining the scope of work and the rate of payment for the Whitney Smith Company.

As the Whitney Smith Company conducts their review of the Dallas Police Department's investigation of the Diamond Ross incident, they will be in touch with the Police Monitor. Once their review is completed, they will submit their final report to the Police Monitor. The Police Monitor will provide a copy of Whitney Smith Company's findings to the Community Police Oversight Board for review, comments, recommendations and further action if needed.

Therefore, per section 37–2(a)(3) conduct an independent investigation into the internal affairs division investigation (IAD) of a critical incident that occurred on August 8, 2018 when Diamond Ross was in police custody and died shortly thereafter. On June 26, 2019, Dallas IAD completed their investigation of Senior Corporal Larry Moody and Officer William Ortega regarding their failure to secure a prisoner with a seat belt during transport and failure to obtain medical treatment for their prisoner when she remained unresponsive.

Our fee for this independent investigation will be set at \$330 per hour not to exceed \$15,000.

SUBJECT Case Updates from the Public Comment Portions of February 11, 2020 Meeting

During the February 11, 2020 Community Police Oversight Board meeting several people spoke about cases during the public comment portions of the meeting. The Office of Community Police Oversight and the Dallas Police Department contacted those individuals to help give them information about the cases they referenced during meeting comments. Below are updates on those cases:

A. Jamal Muhammad Case

The Dallas Police Department was able to verify that the police officers involved in the shooting death of Jamal Muhammad were members of the Dallas Police Department. The officers are (1) Senior Cpl. George Prock, (2) Officer Matthew Kania, (3) Officer Joel Portillo and (4) Officer Jardon Narcisse.

At this this time the case is with the District Attorney's Office and they are preparing to submit it

to a Grand Jury.

The Internal Affairs Division (IAD) of the Dallas Police Department have suspended their investigation pending adjudication of the criminal case.

IAD will be working closely with the Police Monitor when they begin their investigation.

B. Leslie Zenn, Jr. Case

The Dallas Police Department was able to verify that Mr. Zenn was involved in a car accident with a off duty police officer. However, that off duty officer was not employed by the Dallas Police Department. The off-duty officer was employed by The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center.

Some of the confusion about which police department the off-duty officer was a part of may have been contributed to the fact that the Dallas Police Department (DPD) did process the scene of the accident. Therefore, members of DPD were at the scene.

C. Reggie Ruffin Case

The Office of Community Police Oversight will be contacting Mr. Ruffin to schedule an appointment to review his complaint against the Dallas Police Department. The meeting will hopefully take pace the Week of March 9, 2020.
